#### STATISTICAL BULLETIN 2006 - 2007

### ABUSER TREATMENT PROGRAMS

The Council certifies abuser treatment programs utilized by the North Carolina court system to assist batterers. From April 2006 - March, 2007, the Council certified sixty-seven programs statewide.

- 80% of the total referrals were accepted into an abuser treatment program.
- The criminal court system provided 78% of the total number of program referrals.
- The criminal court system provided 80% of the total number of accepted referrals.
- The Division of Social Services provided 12% of the total number of referrals.
- The Division of Social Services provided 11% of the total number of accepted referrals.
- There were 161 more participants who completed the abuser treatment curriculum than those who were terminated from the program.

#### DISPLACED HOMEMAKER PROGRAMS

The North Carolina Council for Women/Domestic Violence Commission distributes state funding to local county programs to be used for providing services to displaced homemakers. In 2006-2007, the Council funded thirty five displaced homemaker programs. The local programs provide job counseling, job training, job placement services, health education, counseling services, and financial management services to displaced homemakers.

- The displaced homemaker programs served 5,545 clients in 2005-2006. The 2006-2007 total represents a 12% decrease in the number of clients served.
- The Mecklenburg county program served the highest number of clients (579) followed by Rockingham (558) and Cumberland (290) counties.
- In 2006-2007, 46% of the clients served were white. Blacks and Hispanics comprised 42% and 5% of the total number of clients served.
- The 34-44 age category comprised the largest group served.
- Women comprised 93% of the clients served.
- Of the total number of clients served, 20% obtained full time employment while 13% obtained part time employment.
- Of the total number of clients served, 23% were placed in a four year college, community college or trade course.
- Of the total number of clients that received an education placement, 60% were placed in a community college.

#### DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PROGRAMS

The North Carolina Council for Women/Domestic Violence Commission distributes state funding to local county programs for victims of domestic violence and to the North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence which provides technical assistance to the programs. Funding is provided to domestic violence programs in all counties. Each local county program provides a 24-hour confidential crisis hotline, crisis intervention services, referrals to other community resources as needed, emergency shelter or shelter referral, advocacy, counseling, and community education.

- The domestic violence programs served 48,173 clients in 2005-2006. The 2006-2007 total represents a 2% decrease in the number of clients served.
- The Alamance county program served the highest number of clients at the local level (3,968) followed by Wake (2,522) and Buncombe (1,751) counties.
- Whites comprised 52% of the total number of clients served by the local county programs.
   Blacks comprised 24% of the total number of clients served, while Hispanics accounted for 9%.
- In 2006-2007, 32% of the clients served were in the 45-54 age groups. The 35-44 age group comprised 18% of the total number of clients served.
- Women comprised 85% of the total number of clients served while men comprised 15%.
- A majority of services provided by the programs included distributing information to clients followed by referring the clients to other organizations for additional assistance.
- In 2005-2006, the local programs received 115,124 calls on the 24-hour crisis lines. In 2006-2007, 119,348 calls were received, representing a 4% increase in volume.
- In 2005-2006, 1,119 clients were referred to other shelters due to a lack of space. Referrals increased in 2006-2007 by 4%.

#### SEXUAL ASSAULT PROGRAMS

The North Carolina Council for Women/Domestic Violence Commission funded seventy-five local county programs for victims of sexual assault and to the North Carolina Coalition Against Sexual Assault which provides technical assistance to the local county programs. Each county program provides a 24-hour confidential crisis hotline, crisis intervention services, referrals to other community resources as needed, emergency shelter or shelter referral, advocacy, counseling and community education.

- In 2005-2006, the local county programs served 8,721 clients. The 2006-2007 total number of clients served represents a 17% decrease in the total number clients served.
- The Buncombe county program served the highest number of clients at the local level (427) followed by New Hanover (400) and Craven (375) counties.
- In 2006-2007, whites comprised 63% of the clients served while 21% were black.
- In 2006-2007, 23% of the clients served were in the 26-40 age groups.
- Women comprised 90% of the total number of clients served while men accounted for 10%.
- Of the total number of assaults, 25% were child sexual offenses. This is a 3% decrease compared to the 2005-2006 child sexual offenses (1,927) reported to the local county programs.
- In 2006-2007, 36% of the offenders were a relative of the victim while 31% were an acquaintance.
