WELCOME: Rev. Ricky Burnett, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 10:02 am with the quorum being present. He acknowledged and welcomed the Commission Members, Tribal Leaders, Chiefs, State Officials, staff, and guests to the December meeting.

Commission members and acknowledged, community members that were suffering from illnesses and the recent deceased family and friends were remembered at that time.

ETHICS STATEMENT: Mr. Greg Richardson, Executive Director, read the Ethics Statement on behalf of the Chairman Burnett. He urged Commission Members to declare any conflicts of interest, or the appearances of conflicts of interest, that may exist in relation to any business matters before the Commission, as mandated by the State Ethics Act. No conflicts were noted.

APPROVAL OF SEPTEMBER 4, 2020, MEETING MINUTES: The minutes of the September 4, 2020, meeting were presented, as a consent item, no objection, by the membership. Therefore, it was tabled for action at the end of the meeting.

PRESENTAIONS:

National Indian Education Association (NIEA) Update:

Dr. Connie Locklear, Title VI Indian Education Program, Director, Robeson County Schools National Indian Education Association (NIEA), Board Member presented the following:

- Discussed the National Indian Education Association (NIEA) Membership
- Discussed the membership fees: Basic \$80, Professional \$150 (from July through June)
- Discussed the geographic distribution of NIEA members.
- Emphasized the importance of joining and being a member of NIEA and why "it is important to have a seat at the table, the importance of our voices to be heard and to be a part of the national Indian education discussions".
- Discussed the advocacy and why it is important to meet and to get to know our Congressional Leaders.
- Discussed the importance of funding for Indian Education Programs.
- Commission members asked clarifying questions regarding membership. Dr. Locklear noted that they first "need to be a member". Second "be part of Committee work at NIEA", she explained the different sub-committees. Dr. Locklear informed that once a member and having been in a committee, when a position becomes available a member can run for a committee seat when it becomes available.
- Mr. Greg Richardson noted that the Commission of Indian Affairs has become a member of NIEA, and he expressed the benefits of the NIEA memberships.

American Indian Solar Energy Initiative:

Laura Combs, Business Development, Director, Eagle Solar & Light, And Ethan Blumenthal, CEO of Good Solar, gave a brief overview. Handouts were included in the Board packet.

- Ms. Combs discussed solar incentives and benefits for non-profits.
- Discussed the HB 589 and its importance for solar energy.
- She pointed out that businesses can save up to 75% with solar incentives. Discussed types of incentives: Incentive 1, Incentive 2, and Incentive 3.
- Mr. Blumenthal, a co-presenter, discussed Good Solar and its renewal energy and energy efficiency solutions for nonprofits, tribes, and communities. He gave a brief overview on Vision, Mission, Services, Rooftop Solar, and Finances
- Mr. Greg Richardson informed members that they could email questions and he will forward the questions to Ms. Combs and Mr. Blumenthal.

Partnerships, Government to Government relationships, and Environmental Justice and Equity challenges:

Michael Regan, Secretary, North Carolina Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) presented the following:

- He expressed the importance of partnership between Tribal Communities and NC Department of Environmental Quality (NCDEQ) was for cultural preservation, air quality, water, and land.
- Strengthening government to government relationships have helped his leadership team. Secretary Regan noted that Mr. John Nicholson, designee at the Commission of Indian Affairs participates quarterly commission meetings.
- It was noted that DEQ is ready to discuss successful government to government partnerships, especially with tribal communities, discuss issues or topics of concern within our state that will impact the NC tribal communities.
- Discussed the Mission of NC DEQ: Site based environmental prosperity of all North Carolinians Stewardship health and prosperity of all North Carolinians. He noted that NC DEQ will work towards inclusion, demand equity, and celebrate the diversity of the people of our great state.
- Discussed the importance of clean air and clean water for present time and future generations to come.
- Discussed the Environmental Justice and Equity Board and its members. Expressed the goal "Work of DEQ and interest of the tribes and protection of land and water".
- Indicated that protecting natural resources is important and critical to the future of our state.
- Discussed the Economic Interest and the importance of the Andrea Harris Task Force. Indicated that the Commission's Executive Director, Greg Richardson, Serves on that Task Force.
- Discussed water quality and protection of rivers, cultural and natural resources as well. Share the same responsibility to work together.
- Discussed social and racial inequity needs.
- Secretary Regan discussed in brief the Atlantic Coastal Pipeline (ACP). He informed the Commission that the tribal outreach began immediately.
- Discussed Governor Cooper's Climate Change Executive Order.
- Discussed Climate Resiliency and Climate Planning. What Climate change impact means to tribal communities and its impact throughout the state.
- Discussed Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) and legislative changes.
- Secretary Regan thanked members for the opportunity to work in partnership with Commission and tribal communities.

Comments from Commission:

- Chairman Rev. Burnett thanked Secretary Regan for his presentation, leadership, and dedication. He extended an invitation to visit all tribal communities.
- Chairman Rev. Burnett also thanked the previous presenters Dr. Connie Locklear, Ms. Combs, and Mr. Blumenthal for copies of their presentations.
 - **Following the December Commission Meeting. Secretary Regan was nominated by the Biden Administrator to serve as Secretary of the US Department of Environmental Protection.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT: Mr. Greg Richardson, Executive Director, NC Commission of Indian Affairs, noted that due to time constraints he will only give highlights of his quarterly report and that a copy of the is included in the meeting packet.

Program Director Quarterly Briefing - Included in the packet.

- Received \$260,000 per year for three years, total \$780,000 for a new grant funding for Victims of Human Trafficking in Native Communities (VHT-NC). The effective date of the grant is October 1, 2020 and will end Oct 30, 2023.
- Gave an overview of the COVID-19 Pandemic Impact on the work of the Commission this quarter.
- Contact Tracing Staff 25 American Indian Contact Tracers were hired in the state this quarter because of the commission's advocacy work.
- 2020 Indian Heritage Month Proclamation was issued by Governor Cooper.
- 2020 Indian Heritage Month Celebration Was held Virtually and was well attended.
- Governor's Interstate Indian Council (GIIC) Was held Virtually and was well attended.
- National Congress of American Indians Annual Convention Was held Virtual and NC Tribes were well represented during the convention.
- Governor's Hometown Strong Initiative is still reaching out to tribal communities.
- Acknowledged Mrs. Sue Faircloth retirement December 31, 2020. Mr. Greg Richardson thanked her dedicated years of service. Ms. Faircloth has completed 37 years with the NC State. Mrs. Faircloth was presented with her state retirement certificate.
- The Executive Director Report was accepted as consent item, no objection and action to adopt the Executive Director Report will be taken when action items are voted on at the end of the meeting.

Presentation

Historically Marginalized Population and Clinical Research – Ms. Jessica Saucier, Associate Director, Clinical Trial Educator, Research and Development Solutions, Clinical Trial Educator. She gave a brief overview. The following was discussed:

• Clinical Research (CR) bringing new medication to the community. Volunteer research study for safety, risk, and wellbeing.



- COVID-19 Inequities (Racial and Ethnicity)
- Clinical Trial (CT) Process
- Diversity and why it was important.
- New medication or treatment must be conducted based on age, race, ethnicity, weight, and sex.
- Noted that white, black, or Hispanic may react different to medication.
- Indicated that Clinical Research can be complicated. How CR has changed and evolved over the years to ensure human rights are protected throughout the process.
- Expressed all Clinical Trials must follow strict process. It is completely voluntary. Before enrolling for Clinical Trials (CT), participants must sign a consent form between the researcher and volunteer to make sure everything is outlined.
- Indicated that safety is a top priority in Clinical Trials. Ms. Saucier discussed in brief the safety protocol with regards to the pharmaceutical companies.
- In conclusion, Ms. Saucier shared her email address and web link www.ensemble.com
